Electric Island is a celebration of the Art Deco style in Tasmania. Art Deco originated in Europe in the 1920s and became the dominant style of the period between the World Wars. Art Deco has many influences, but above all it revels in the speed and energy of the Industrial Age, in dynamic clean lines and bold graphics.

Electric Island takes energy as its main theme. Through Hydro industrialisation, Tasmanian governments attempted to jump-start the sleepy colonial island into the age of modernism. Tasmanians sought to redefine themselves, creating some of Australia's finest Art Deco public buildings.



An international public art installation by John Vella. Metaphorically reuniting his family from Malta, Elcho Island (north of Darwin) and Taximumia, TerraTowel can be seen 24 hours a day in various locations around Salamanca Place for the duration of the Festival.
